From the Desk of Our Principal



Season's Greetings!

I hope this newsletter finds you well and anticipating the upcoming holiday season! As you know, the first semester of the school year will end on December 20, 2023. In an effort to help students navigate an admittedly difficult time of year, we have historically held finals over the course of four days. By doing so, students have no more than two final-examinations to prepare for on any given day. This also allows us to expand the time available for final-examination make-up to include some time during the regular school day.

As you know, part of our Vision Statement as a school states that we want "all students to have a voice." Consequently, we frequently ask student opinions about our schedule and other matters

of importance. We do understand that what may have worked last year or the year before, may not work today or in the future. Last May we gave our students the opportunity to voice their preference related to the final examination schedule. Approximately 69% of the respondents desired to keep the 4-day schedule in effect. As long as we have the cooperation of students and parents in understanding that these are full school days and attendance is expected, our staff will continue to be sensitive to this preference. In the event that we have large numbers of students being excused for the portions of the day where final exams are not being administered, we may reevaluate and return to a 3-day final exam schedule. Since November 1, counselors have been working to fill gaps and adjust second semester schedules. Please understand that all schedules are tentative and therefore, students should view their schedule on Campus Portal the first day of second semester. Students who have scheduling issues should contact their school counselor before finals week. Please note that counselors are not available during winter break. Once second semester begins, schedule changes are only approved for levels or being misplaced in a class (eg. English 10 to Honors English 10).

FAFSA

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WHAT HELPS US CAMPAIGN

This campaign focuses on people's personal stories of what strengths help them when dealing with the big three emotions – anger, anxiety/worry, and depression or feeling sad or down. Everyone struggles with at least one of these emotions. This campaign is about identifying which emotions you wrestle with the most and which strengths help you through it.

This Generation has had a host of opportunities as well, performing with area choirs at White Concert Hall, touring the community, and preparing for their annual Candlelight Concert on December 16th.

The WRHS Chorale has a big performance schedule ahead of them. The group will sing at the Kauffman Center on Dec. 18th with Spire Chamber Ensemble in their performance of the Messiah. Alongside this huge performance, Chorale is preparing for their program at the Kansas Music Educators Association in February. The group has also performed at the WRHS homecoming game and Veterans Day Ceremony.

The WRHS Trebles will sing with the Kansas Ballet and Topeka Symphony in the annual production of The Nutcracker on Dec. 16th and 17th at TPAC. They also celebrated their combined tenor/bass choir for their performance of "Tell My Father" at the WRHS veterans day ceremony.

Finally, the Winter Choir Concert will be held on Dec. 5th at 6:00pm and 7:30pm. They are so lucky to have a wealth of opportunity in the program!



Congratulations to Courtney Nottingham and Ben Holcomb! Their programs have been selected for a featured performance at the Kansas Music Educators Association annual conference in Wichita at the end of February. To be considered for selection, the Chamber Orchestra and WRHS Chorale had to submit an audition tape and compete against some of the best programs in the State of Kansas for recognition. Congratulations to them on this significant achievement. Additionally, both programs, along with the WRHS Band, are currently fundraising for a trip to California in March.



The Marching Band performed at the Olathe North Invitational Festival on October 7th and placed 8th in the preliminary competition and 11th in the finals. They received a Superior rating at the Central States Marching Festival at Kansas State University. The band capped off their season with a performance at the Kansas Bandmasters Association Marching Band Championship hosted at Kansas University and they placed 12th overall. For the Northeast Kansas Music Educators Association All-District Honor Band, they claimed 31 spots between the concert band and jazz band plus 3 alternates. Those students are now eligible to audition for the All-State Honor Band.



The debate program is off to a strong start this season! They have had dozens of students earn medals at tournaments across the state, including top 3 finishes at Topeka High, Blue Valley Southwest, Olathe Northwest, and elimination round competition in Oklahoma, Iowa, Illinois, and Texas. They have also gualified to the Tournament of Champions for the 6th year in a row, and the 7th time in WRHS school's history. Congrats to Kavinayashri Chidambaranthan/Aditi Nimishakavi (pictured top right, below) on that accomplishment. Currently, the program is one of the top 10 schools in the nation in terms of our school strength according to the National Speech and Debate Association, which is a measurement of both student membership and team success. Congrats to Mr. Ellis and Mr. Duff on a fantastic start!

The Math Club competed at Emporia State University. The Algebra Team placed 5th and the Escape Room Team placed 2nd. Individually on the geometry test Shri Chidambaranathan placed 9th and Sam Byrne placed 22nd. On the algebra test, Blaine McVey placed 6th and Sam Byrne placed 16th. Congratulations to the contestants and their sponsor, Mr. McVey.



AFJROTC has been very busy volunteering in the local community. To date, they have already volunteered more than 600 hours performing color guards for WRHS sports teams, Ducks Unlimited, VFW, and the WRHS Alumni Dinner. Additionally, they provided servers as well as a setup and tear down crew for the annual VFW Hand Up Stand Up Motorcycle Ride to support the local VA hospital. The Unit has also supported the elementary schools by volunteering at Jay Shidler and Wanamaker fall festivals this month. The marksmanship season is in full swing and the young cadets have made strides every week. Col. Daniels believes that they will surprise some of their competitors before the year is over. Finally, the unit flew on a refueling mission with the 190th Air Refueling Wing. Forty-eight cadets were able to fly the training mission to refuel 3 B-52 bomber aircraft!

The Girls Golf Team traveled to Emporia to compete in the KSHSAA State Tournament at Emporia Municipal Golf Course. The girls qualified for State after taking 3rd in a Regional that consisted of several of the State's top teams. They've enjoyed numerous successes this season with runner-up finishes at City & League as well as placing near the top of several other high-quality tournaments. The team recently concluded their season with a 4th place finish in the 6A State Championship. The ladies competed hard making the cut for Day 2 and moved up the leaderboard on the final round en route to a final four finish. Seniors: Raegan Peteresen and Olivia Smith, juniors: Reece Randall, Natalie Peterson, and Colbey Stead and Freshmen: Kaliyn Petersen represented the team at the State Championship held at Emporia Golf Course.



The boys soccer team had an incredible season with a final record of 19-2-0. The only losses were to Elgin HS (Illinois) in a national tournament and in the Class 6A semifinals against SM West. The boys won the Centennial League for the 29th year in a row! They went 5-0 in the league and outscored opponents 22-1. The team also won the Regional championship for the 23rd time in school history. They went to the class 6A Final Four for the 16th time in school history, and took 3rd place, beating Dodge City 2-1 in the final game of the season.

This season, the team scored 74 goals, gave up 16 goals, and had 11 shoutouts. Out of the 105 schools that



play soccer in Kansas, only one (Maize South - 20 games won) won more games than they did this fall. Washburn Rural is one of only four teams in school history to win 19 games in a season (2002, 2009, 2021, and 2023). Devon Rutschmann, senior, led the team with 24 goals and 13 assists. He finished his high school career with 49 goals (3rd most in school history) and 39 assists (2nd most in school history). 1st team all Centennial League includes: Devon Rutschmann, Griffin Heinen, Cohen Nimz, Ryder Nikkel, and Dylan Willingham. 2nd team all Centennial League includes: Draden Chooncharoen, Brandon Hamilton, Hayden Shriver, and Dylan Willingham. Honorable mention all Centennial League includes Liam Morrison. Congratulations to these players for making the Class 6A All-State Soccer Teams - 1st Team: Devon Rutschmann, 2nd Team: Griffin Heinen, Ethan Uhlrig, and Honorable Mention: Cohen Nimz, Hayden Shriver, and Dylan Willingham!



The Volleyball team has enjoyed another successful season posting a 26-10 record and a #1 seed in the West bracket going into Sub-State. They finished with a 29-12 record, won the Centennial league for the 3rd year in a row, and qualified for state for the 7th year in a row.

The Boys and Girls Cross Country teams recently finished out their seasons. The cross country teams brought home several championships this year. Both the Boys and Girls won City Titles and the Girls brought home a Centennial League title with Junior Payton Fink winning the individual title. The boys finished in 3rd place in the League race. The Boys team took 5th at Regional with Connor Olsen and Brooks Kehoe qualifying as individuals for the state cross country meet. The Girls team won the regional meet, qualifying the entire team to state where they went on to take 4th place. Payton Fink was the individual runner up at the state meet.



The 2023 Washburn Rural football team finished their season with a record of 11-1, reaching the Sub-State round of the KSHSAA playoffs for the first time since 1989. The Junior Blues finished the regular season with a perfect mark of 8-0 and were undefeated in Centennial League play, giving them their second Centennial League championship in three years. In their playoff run, they also won Regional and Sectional championships.



Coach McKaig and the Cheer Team were excited to host the Rural Spirit Showcase. 800 athletes showcased their competitive cheer and dance routines at WRHS on November 4 as part of the Rural Showcase. The event was open to the public and admission was \$5 or 5 canned food items (which are donated to Harvester's). The event annually attracts about 4,000 spectators. They competed at The Stormont Vail Event Center hoping to continue their success as the only team to hold a top two position in the State for Class 6A for 5 years straight! All 3 of their prelim performances hit, their crowd leading and fight song were the highest score of the entire competition all day! They made it into finals, being one of the top 6 teams, ready to perform one last time. Although they finished 5th, they put their best routines out on the mat and they could not be more proud. They LOVED all of the support from the WRHS community who came to cheer them on!



Coach Tiller, Coach Hunter, and the Dance Team attended Rural Spirit Showcase, hosted by the WRHS Cheer Team on November 4. Their high energy hip hop and gameday state routines both received 1 ratings! The team was then statebound on November 17, and competed at The Stormont Vail Event Center, hoping to continue their success of holding a top two position in Kansas Dance Team state history. The team put their best routines out on the floor, but sadly did not make the top 6 taken to finals. The dancers can hold their heads high knowing they performed with all they had and left absolutely everything on the floor. They still have half of a season left to continue growing and performing.

KSU Computer Competition



WRHS had seven teams in the K-State Competition. Four teams competed in the beginner division and three teams in the advanced division. Teams are given an algorithm to solve in a short period of time. Teams are awarded points based on how quickly and accurately they solve the problem. WRHS had two teams place in the top ten in the beginner division and in the advanced we had a 12th & 14th place out of 38 teams. Additionally, students get to see K-State's campus, tour the engineering building, and experience lunch in the student union.

KSU Women in Business Summit

On November 13, twelve Washburn Rural High students went to the K-State Women in Business Career Summit. The keynote speakers were Kristine Davis who is a spacesuit engineer for NASA and Jeannette Hernandez-Prenger the founder and CEO of ECCO Select. They also heard from current K-State business students on their experiences and advice on college. Junior Emerie Catlin stated "I loved getting to hear from current students and their business majors. It was also nice hearing from successful women who said that they were not 100% sure on their major going into college and even switched it."

A highlight of the event was Senior Molly Didde winning a \$1,000



scholarship to K-State. She was one of 10 students to receive this award. Molly stated, "The Women in Business Summit was a very interesting and fun event, and it was enlightening to hear advice and experiences from women in the career field I plan on joining. It helped me understand the education and career options I could pursue after high school, and I was lucky enough to get a financial boost with a scholarship to the KSU College of Business!"

Career and Technical Education

On November 2nd WRHS Bank students and their sponsor Brian McFall attended the Personal Finance Symposium at Washburn University. The day focused on five areas: Earning, Employment and Income, Budgeting, Savings, Credit and Debt, and lastly Consumer Project.

The first session was all about Earning, Employment, and Income - healthy personal finances require planning and management. John Imming, VP of Wealth Management at Advisors Excel, led this session. Students learned that healthy personal finances require planning and managing. Students also begin to analyze the financial implications of their educational and career choices as a basis for understanding the relationship between earnings and personal finance. Students also explored how their decisions can affect other people they have relationships with and practice using healthy behaviors to discuss shared financial decisions.

The second session focused on Budgeting - the importance of building and maintaining a monthly budget. Dr. David Sollars, Dean - Washburn University School of Business, led this lesson. Students investigated the importance of budgeting and how to plan for staying within a budget.



The third session was all about savings. A healthy savings plan is necessary for life, especially emergencies. Clint Patty, JD, Managing Partner at Clayton Wealth Partners, presented this lesson. Students analyzed the role that saving plays in their personal finances. They explored how having a healthy savings plan is necessary in all phases of life but is especially critical for big-ticket items and emergencies.

The fourth session's focus was on Credit and Debt - identifying wise and poor uses of credit and the risks of debt can help you. Justin Gordon, Portfolio Manager at Capitol Federal, led this session. Students analyzed the importance of good credit and the outcomes of wise and poor use of credit.

The last session was on Consumer Protection - learn about financial threats and how to protect yourself. Katy Nelson, CEO of the Topeka Area Building Association, led us through this topic. Students explored consumer protection basics, including financial literacy, avoiding scams, managing their money, using credit and loans carefully, and protecting their personal information.

On November 10th, WRHS Bank and DECA members hosted Andrew Crim, Personal Wellness Coach at Advisors Excel. He spoke to Ms. Reno's Accounting 1 students as well as Mr. McFall's Business Management and Banking and Finance students.

The focus of his presentation was on Budgeting - Cash Flow. Some of the highlights from the morning were: pay yourself first, avoid bad debt, live within your means - spend less than you earn, and 50/30/20. 50 percent of your budget goes to needs, 30 percent goes to wants, and 20 percent goes to savings.

In regards to saving, the first thing to do is create a \$1,000 Emergency fund - this should cover about 90% of emergencies that may come up. Next, pay all bad debt off - high interest consumer debt. After those two have been achieved you next need to focus on boosting emergency savings to cover 3 months of expenses. Once all of these are met then you can focus on investing, having your money work for you. Andrew said to focus on 15% savings and 5% donations and giving back to others.

The end of his presentation Andrew focused on advice for high school students. The first thing he spoke on was the spotlight effect - people are judging you a lot less than you think! Next he focused on trying everything, helping other people, and asking more questions - you don't have to do all the talking when meeting people or networking - try asking more questions and speak less than 30% of the time.
