Hello again,

As we wrap up the first 9-week grading period, I want to take a moment to reflect on the exciting start to our school year. There is a lot to celebrate, and we're looking forward to even more successes as we move forward. As both a parent in this district and as the principal of WRHS, I want to assure you that your child is receiving an excellent education. However, we know that for some students, learning can present challenges, and we're here to offer any support they might need. There is still plenty of time to address any concerns before the semester ends, and I'd like to share some helpful resources that are available.

One of the best tools for staying informed about your child's progress is our Parent Portal. It allows you to track grades, attendance, behavior, lunch account balances, and more. If you haven't yet activated your Parent Portal account, you can get your activation key by contacting my Administrative Assistant, Ms. Susan Kaspar, at 339-4104. She will gladly assist you with the process of getting started. The portal updates regularly, so it provides a real-time view of your child's performance. If you're noticing any areas of concern, please don't hesitate to reach out to your child's teachers for additional support.

Teachers are available before school starting at 7:30 AM and after school, typically until 3:30 PM, to provide extra help. Some teachers who also coach may not be available after school, but they are happy to schedule time with students before school. The last month has been super busy for AFJROTC staff and students. We volunteered over 500 hours, took two great curriculum in action trips and participated in 4 different fundraising activities. And we also began our marksmanship season.

AFJROTC cadets volunteered at Jay Shideler, McCarter, and Wanamaker elementary schools. Cadets ran bounce houses and carnival games at all three schools.

Cadets provided for the financial future of the corps by working concession stands, cleaning the football stadium and conducting a Vertical Raise online giving campaign.

AFJROTC proves that learning can also be fun as cadets met the USAF Thunderbirds and toured their aircraft. 42 cadets flew a four hour mission with the 190th Air Refueling Wing. Refueling three bomber aircraft during the trip.





And finally, marksmanship season began at the end of September. The marksmanship team is currently 0-2 but, competed against the number 1 and number 2 teams in the distinguished division of our league. All in all it has been a busy and rewarding start to the school year for AFJROTC.

The Innovation Center at Washburn Rural High School has officially opened its doors, offering students an exciting new space equipped with cutting-edge technology. From state-of-the-art classrooms to fully equipped labs, students are diving into hands-on learning experiences like never before.



"Regardless of what program our kids are in, I think our greatest hope is that they're in the classroom, and in the shops, and in the labs acquiring skills and knowledge that really helps them bridge the gap to whatever is next for them," said Associate Principal Kyle Reed.

The 50,000-square-foot center is part of an ongoing series of construction and renovation projects taking place across the Auburn-Washburn district to enhance the student learning experience. WRHS currently offers 18 career-focused Pathway programs approved by the Kansas State Department of Education. A remarkable 75 percent of students will take at least one Pathway course during their time at the high school. Nine of the Pathway programs – Animal Science; Comprehensive Agriculture; Power, Structural & Technical Systems; Construction & Design: Construction; Construction & Design: Design; Digital Media; Biomedical; Restaurant & Event Management; and Programming & Software — are housed in the new Innovation Center.

That future is one of constant transformation. According to the Georgetown Workforce Study, 70 percent of jobs will require specialized skills by 2031, but only 35 percent of those jobs will require a four-year degree.

Career and Technical Education

Career and College Preparation

Career Technical Education (CTE) is a valuable enhancement to traditional classroom learning. It allows students to gain knowledge and hands-on experience about specific career pathways. With an emphasis on helping students be prepared to be successful in high-wage, high-demand careers, Pathways are designed to move along a continuum of career awareness, career exploration, and career readiness. WRHS offers fifteen Career Pathways. Learn more at <u>wrhs.net/cte</u>

Work-based learning provides high school students with valuable hands-on experience and exposure to real-world work environments. By participating in job shadow experiences or internships, students have the opportunity to apply the knowledge and skills they learn in the classroom to practical situations. This practical experience helps students develop a deeper understanding of a career field, gain valuable industry-specific skills, and build professional networks. Work-based learning prepares high school students by equipping them with the necessary skills, knowledge, and confidence to succeed in the workforce after graduation.

This semester there are 17 WRHS students working in the community from the following pathways: Education, Agricultural, Finance, Marketing, and Health/BioMedical/BioChemistry. Workplace Experience is also offered "In-house" with our school businesses, Common Grounds, The Shack, WRHS Bank. Students are gaining real world experiences while operating the businesses here at school while working with our community partners.

WRHS offers Certificates and Industry Recognized Credentials in several pathways

<u>YouScience</u> is a valuable tool for classrooms that helps students explore their interests, skills, and potential career paths. It provides personalized assessments and career recommendations based on a student's aptitudes and interests. With YouScience, students can make more informed decisions about their future education and career choices, leading to greater engagement and success in the classroom.

NCCER, or the National Center for Construction Education and Research, offers industry-recognized credentials for high school students in construction-related fields. By participating in NCCER programs, high school students can gain valuable skills and knowledge that prepare them for careers in construction and related industries. NCCER certifications provide students with a competitive edge in the job market and open doors to a wide range of opportunities in the construction industry. Students are eligible to participate this semester.

The Culinary Arts students take the <u>ServSafe</u> Food Handler and Manager exams in the culinary course. These exams verify that a manager or person-in-charge has sufficient food safety knowledge to protect the public from food borne illness, ensures proper personal hygiene, prevents cross-contamination, controls time and temperature when handling food, and proper cleaning and sanitizing.

Paraeducator Certificate This Program offers statewide standards-based training for all paraeducators, and supports a career growth ladder that prepares students for employment as a paraeducator or moving forward with their post secondary plans in Education.

Excel in CTE was launched in 2012 as a plan to enhance career technical education in Kansas and better prepare high school students for college and careers. Kansas high school students qualify for state-funded college tuition in approved technical courses offered by Kansas technical and community colleges. WRHS students have the opportunity to attend <u>Washburn Tech</u> as part of their regular school day, or they may elect to take online courses outside of school hours.

Naviance, <u>Pathful</u>, and YouScience are resources available to all students and can help students explore career options, employment trends in those industries, and the training or education needed.

Community Partners

Advisory Committees assist in the development and operation of the CTE cluster/pathway by keeping instructors up to date on industry standards and trends. They also provide students the opportunity to build a professional network and may offer job shadow experiences or internships. - Photos must be vertical (or they will be cropped to fit a vertical space).
